Getting Community Hours for Your Work:

High School students are required to complete a certain number of community hours each year. Check with your school on specific details, but in general, your activity must be approved and overseen by an adult in an authoritative position with the school, a business or non-profit. When your volunteer work is completed, the person who you've worked with on the project, must provide a signed letter that states what you did, for whom and for how many hours. That's it! Why not take on an issue like homelessness and tie it into community service hours requirements?

- Sometimes it seems like giving money to panhandlers helps them, but in reality, it perpetuates and encourages them to continue living on the streets.
- There are colorful-yellow Britto-styled meters all over the city. When you deposit spare change in those meters, every penny of your donation goes to providing food and shelter for a homeless person.
- People who ask for money, panhandlers, are often NOT homeless and often use the money for unsavory things. Do not give money to panhandlers no matter how good it makes you feel.
- Never bully bullying, hurting, or demeaning a person who is experiencing homelessness is wrong.
- Many famous people have counted themselves homeless at one time or another - Jewel, Tyler Perry, Halle Berry, Don Imus, Kelly Clarkson, Lil' Kim, and Harry Houdini.

Check out the following ideas to help the homeless. Mix and match to make ideas work for you and the school!

If you are in Kindergarten - 5th grade you might like to:

- Host a canned food, kitchenware or toiletries drive.
 While holidays are a great time to bring awareness to hunger issues, canned food drives can be done successfully any time of the year.
- Launch a sock and underwear drive. Socks are certainly needed during the colder months of the year.

Volunteer... Tutor, read, donate

If you are in high school you might like to:

- Host a movie and discussion night and show great films like "The Blind Side" or "The Soloist."
- Meet up with friends at a homeless feeding shelter and help prepare meals or serve food.
- With school administration support, spearhead a Sleepover Night where kids talk about homeless issues and get to know what it's like not to sleep in their own bed.
- Use arts programs, theater groups, and musical outlets as your platform to talk about homeless issues.
- Host a fundraiser to raise gift cards which can be donated to the homeless.
- Donate spare event tickets to a homeless shelter (i.e., movies, sporting events).

If you are in 6th, 7th, or 8th grade you might like to:

- Host a bake sale with proceeds to benefit a local homeless shelter.
- Coordinate a class tour of a homeless shelter so fellow students get a taste of the issues that homeless students encounter.
- Tap into sports, performance groups or entertainment clubs to ask permission to donate an event's proceeds to the homeless.
- Volunteer at a shelter to read, organize games for the young children, organize donations or tutor students. Ask a shelter near you what needs they have.
- Celebrate the end of the school year, the 100th day of school, a big school milestone or sports win with a food or clothing drive. Contact a homeless shelter first and find out what their needs are.
